President's Message

I hope to dispel the sense of distrust and insecurity which is why I felt it important to begin addressing the recent communications from Corporate and other EWI Chapter members. The board is increasingly more aware of some of the heightened issues that face the EWI organization. We believe that the lack of transparency

at the corporate level has led to swift and perhaps at times, hasty decisions by the corporate board. We also believe that those decisions have likely impacted other Chapters and perhaps have been, in part, the disclosure of some Chapters.

I would like to assure the Wichita membership at this time, that our Chapter hasn't been impacted by some of the recent discussions. Our Chapter has experienced delays in corporate communications and inconsistency of processing paperwork. While this has had a limited effect on the budget, it has not been to the detriment of the Chapter. It has been the philosophy of our board to educate ourselves on the budget, our current processes and help to identify better ways of servicing our Chapter members. I would also like to state that I believe we have a strong Chapter, one that represents Wichita and the firms of the community.

At this time, it is our position to gather additional information before making a statement of response, but we do believe that a response to the corporate board is necessary. To that end and while we gather information, we want to encourage all of you to open the lines of communication to the board. Unfortunately, the April Chapter meeting does not lend itself to this type of discussion and so we will reserve time at the May meeting to conduct a business meeting. To make for a more efficient discussion, the board respectfully asks for members to submit their questions, concerns and thoughts by May 6 so that we can invest time at our May board meeting to discuss these topics.

As always, our members are welcome to attend our board meetings. If you would like to participate in the May board meeting, it is being held at High Touch in our Team Center from 11:30 am - 1:00 pm on May 11.

A Conversation with Diana Norton

As the 2004 recipient of the EWISP for the Wichita EWI Chapter, Diana Norton continues to receive accolades in her candidacy for her PhD. Diana was recently granted the 2016-2017 Fulbright U.S. Student Award to Spain. She will use the *Fulbright* year to complete her research for her dissertation, "Looking to American Film: Hispanidad and the Americas in Early-Franco Spanish Culture."

With your dissertation topic, what are you hoping to gain by your research?

With my research, I hope to further our understanding of how flows of information, ideas and ideologies translate across borders, and of how popular culture aids in this movement. (But if I'm being completely honest, my research is just straight-up fun.)

What will your year in Spain be like? It seems like such a short time for such research. What is the first thing you hope to do for your research?

This project is actually the culmination of years of independent research projects (undergraduate and master's thesis), as well as several summers of research in Spain. A year will be plenty of time to complete my research and finish writing the project, while allowing me access to the archives that I need in order to do so. I am already exchanging emails with several scholars in

Spain, and I hope to meet them in person while I'm in Madrid so as to further engage them intellectually. But my primary course of action will be to revisit the libraries and archives where I began my research for any new sources, and also to explore new archives that I have only recently discovered since being back in the States.

What does your research entail? Is it immersion or will you be studying from the past culture? My research entails reading a LOT of film and gossip magazines from the 1940s and 1950s, as well as reading newspapers and watching films.

What is your ultimate career path? Where do you see yourself ending up a year from now? My ultimate career path is that of a full-time professor, and a year from now, I hope to have landed a tenure-track position at a major university.
